A DEPLORABLE SITUATION

There should be many a blush of embarrassment as the Campus Corner "Bethany Budget Thermometer" is read. A short statement tells a sad story. Some of the statements sent in by Bethany's President should be repeated for emphasis:

"Only SIX churches have paid anything of their Bethany Budget since the Bible School opened for the 1958-59 School Year." "Only THREE churches paid anything on their Bethany Budget during the month of October."

"76% of our churches PAID NOTHING on their 1958-59 Bethany Budget." "On October 30th. we were unable to pay all the staff their salaries, to say nothing of other current bills which are past due." This is a deplorable situation! To think that we commit the vital task of administering our Bethany Bible College to a group of capable and consecrated people, and then ignore our obligation to them. We are guilty of gross negligence.

Brother Pastor, how would you feel if the members of your church who engaged you to shepherd them, look to you for spiritual food and guidance, expect you to be diligent in attending to the duties of your office, should be so thoughtless as to neglect payment of your salary or contribution to your offerings?

Brother Layman, what would you think if your employer who requires of your earnest and faithful labour should "forget" to pay you wages, and leave you without means to provide your family with the necessities of life and honour the commitments you have made to your creditors?

It is high time that we took our obligations more seriously. It is shameful that we ask men and women to assume heavy responsibilities in Christian service, and then fail to support them as we ought.

I have had no request or suggestion from the forgotten workmen at Bethany to write as I have. I write out of the sense of shock and shame that swept over me as I read the item sent in for publication in the "Campus Corner."

The outlook must be pretty bleak for the Bethany staff. Perhaps there is some question as to whether the work they are doing is appreciated. I'm sure we pastors would face that temptation under similar circumstances.

This is a situation that calls for action on a denomination-wide basis, action that should be taken immediately. I hope that we may act quickly enough to allow for some more encouraging report from Bethany even before time for publication of the Nov. 29th. Highway.

At best, progress toward recovery through medical care would be slow and painful. Oh that we might pray through for divine aid, that the Lord might "stretch forth His hand to heal!"

Let us cheer our friends with cards and letters assuring them of our prayerful concern for them. Such messages are tremendously meaningful in time of affliction.

And can we not give some financial aid also, through individual gifts and offerings from churches? Surely such gifts and offerings would savour of the true spirit of Christian love and concern.
