### Meductic, N. B.

Greetings in the name of our blessed Lord.

Once again we would like to inform you concerning the work of the Lord in this part of his vineyard. While we do not have anything spectacular to report, yet we do feel that God has been very real unto us as pastor and people, since we last reported to you.

During the Summer months, following Beulah Camp, our hearts were thrilled and challenged afresh, when five precious young people sought and found the Lord in saving grace. Praise His Name! In September, we began a series of Revival Meetings that we continued in each of our churches. Rev. Arnold Stairs, Royalton, N. B., came with us first for a meeting in his home church at Middle Southampton. The services were well attended, even though another campaign was carried on in the Community at the same time. It seemed in every service that God was pouring out blessing upon blessing, and although we did not see the new victories that we would like to have seen, our church was strengthened and held steady under the ministry of this young man of God.
