N. H. A. CONVENTION

The 90th Annual Convention of the National Holiness Association will be held April 8-10, 1958, at Hotel Sherman in Chicago. Announcement was made by the Executive Committee at its November 7th meeting in Chicago.

The Executive Director, Dr. Paul L. Kindschi, said the theme of the convention will be, PROCLAIMING THE WESLEYAN MESSAGE. Seven public addresses will be delivered by leaders in the movement. Daily seminars will be conducted in the areas of doctrine, evangelism, education, missions, camp meetings, Christian homes, youth, Sunday Schools, and visual aids.

The Executive Committee is composed of Dr. Myron F. Boyd, director and speaker of the Light and Life Hour radio broadcast; Dr. Paul S. Rees, pastor of the First Covenant Church of Minneapolis, Minnesota; Dr. Roy S. Nicholson, president of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America; Bishop Leslie R. Marston, senior bishop of the Free Methodist Church of North America; the Reverend Kenneth E. Geiger, general superintendent of the United Missionary Church; and Morris W. Davis, Nazarene layman of of Indianapolis, Indiana. These men represent a constituency of 21 Holiness denominations, 160 state and county auxiliary groups, 60 colleges and seminaries, and 12 foreign missionary boards, all of which espouse the experience of the infilling of the Holy Spirit along lines of the Wesleyan distinctiveness.

The National Holiness Association, with offices at 1128 Metropolitan Building, Minneapolis, Minnesota, is launching the most aggressive program of its 91 years of service. Dr. Kindschi reports that he "finds a new surge of interest in the deeper life among evangelicals everywhere." He adds that "we of the Wesleyan persuasion are more interested in uniting our witness with all for a real movement of the Holy Ghost than we are in insisting on certain shibboleths of the past."
