tent rendering On the evening of November 10th a number of our ministers in the Area and a fine local congregation met to organize the Reformed Baptist Church of Houlton, Me. After words of commendation to all who had helped to bring the Houlton work to the present place of existence, Don. Harding led the congregation in the fine song, "Holiness Forever More". A scripture was read by Rev. Arnold Stairs and prayer was made by Rev. John Mc-Elhinney. Rev. Arthur Owens presented the Bible as the Church's authority in matters of Doctrine and Practise. Rev. Randolph Nicholson read the Church Covenant, after which we emphasized the necessity of those contemplating uniting with the Church thinking carefully before doing so. We advised them of the importance of being in full agreement and accord with the doctrines of the Alliance and especially that they consent to the doctrine of "second blessing holiness". We then called for those who had prayerfully considered the matter to present themselves at the front of the Church and were made very happy when seventeen candidates for membership formed a line in front of the Altar. The Right Hand of Fellowship was given by the pastor Rev. Neal Rice. This was a very beautiful part of the service as we were made sensible of the strong bond of unity and love existing between Reverend Rice and his people.

Rev. Leslie Hicks prayed the consecration prayer. Hazel Owens and Aleen Hicks sang Rhodeheaver's great hymn, "Then My Soul Shall Fear No Ill."

In accordance with the rules of our Manual I then addressed the New Church on their duties and privileges.
