## GIDEONS SET GOAL FOR DISTRIBUTING BIBLES

Members of the Gideons International, at their national convention in Louisville, Kentucky, fixed a goal of distributing 3,600,000 copies of the Scriptures during the coming year—their sixtieth in placing Bibles in public places. Last year the Gideons distributed 2,892,125 copies. The Scriptures went to 41 nations. They also donated 894,755 New Testaments to school children. The goal for next year is 1,500,000 New Testaments.

## INNOCENT ALCOHOL

Life magazine reported a couple of years ago that every day 175,000 workers miss work because of hangovers. Alcoholism costs American industry at least one billion dollars annually in lost man-hours of labor. At least 50,000,000 mandays of labor are lost annually because of alcohol.

After reaching the age of thirty-five, total abstainers can expect to live three and one-half years longer than those who drink.

The National Safety Council reminds us that between Pearl Harbor and V-J Day, more Americans were killed by highway accidents than were lost in combat. And it is estimated that 22 per cent of these deaths were traceable directly to the use of alcohol.

One bottle of beer, which contains half an ounce of alcohol, reduces reflex action 6 per cent. Two bottles of beer reduce it 11 per cent.

## FAMED BIBLES SOLD

A collection of twenty-four early Bibles were sold at auction in London, England, for a total of \$30,729. An American bidder paid \$4,200 for the second edition of Tyndale's version of the Book of Genesis.
