Then perhaps you receive a letter from one who has moved away and is praising the Lord for His goodness. These are souls who were perhaps reached by Home Mission Churches. Could we reach more souls if we would give more? Truly Jesus said, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel!" Have we prayed for Home Missions as well as for Foreign Mission? Has our Home Mission Board sent out an appeal to you? Are we Home Mission minded so that our denomination will grow? Let us look at life on a Home Mission field and ask ourselves the question, "what am I called to do for God?"

BETHANY HAS RECORD ENROLLMENT

On Wednesday, September 16, Bethany Bible College resumed classes with the largest enrollment in its fifteenyear history. The first day enrollment reached sixty-one and increased to sixty-three by the end of the week. Two more students were expected. In addition to these full-time students there was a few special students who swelled the number to sixty-eight. The previous record enrollment in 1952 was fifty-nine.

Faculty and students alike rejoiced in the increase even though it brought its problems. Temporarily seven girls had to be accommodated at a faculty member's home while an on-campus building is being renovated for their use. Second-hand furniture had to be located, purchased, and moved. Inside the Administration building a partition had to be removed and furniture re-located to provide sufficient room for the grade eleven class, thirty in number. To provide the enlarged classroom, the former reception room bowed out and left a lack; more space is needed for the reception of guests and group activities.

The music department, thriving under the leadership of Mr. Patton, outgrew its facilities the first week and created the need of another piano and practice room. Twenty-six students had registered for private lessons in piano and voice.

This year's student body come from Michigan, Maine, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island. Approximately forty are New Brunswickers and Reformed Baptists. Eight other Protestant communions are represented. Generally speaking, they all like "it".

Former staff members continuing in their respective positions are Mr. M. D. Mitchell and Rev. L. S. Johnson. New staff members are Rev. C. E. Stairs, Rev. J. A. Stevens, Mr Morris Patton, Miss Dorothy Wilson, and Miss Edith Larsen. This year's cook is Mr. Howard Thompson, Sr., a professional cook and a man of fine character.

All in all, the year promises to be a successful one at Bethany. With the unstinted support of our constituency and friends and the blessing of God we can expect much. We can count on God. Can we count on you?
