my sin, and bring some of his fruit to him, calling my son to tell him how he had found Christ. But he was unconscious of all around. I told him how dear he had been to me; I craved his pardon for my unfaithfulness, and promised to care for his widow and fatherless little ones; but his only reply, murmured as if in a troubled dream, was, 'Touch not mine anointed, and do my prophets no harm.'

"I stayed by him all night, and at daybreak I closed his eyes.

"Well, sir, those dying words sounded in my ears from the coffin and from the grave. When I slept, Christ stood before me in my dream, saying, 'Touch not mine anointed, and do my prophets no harm.' Those words followed me until I fully realised the esteem in which Christ holds those men who have given up all for His sake, and I vowed to love them evermore for His sake, even if they were not perfect. And since that day, sir,

I have talked less than before

and have supported my pastor, even if he is not 'a very extraordinary man.' My tongue shall cleave to the roof of my mouth and my right hand forget her cunning before I dare to put asunder what God has joined together. When a minister's work is done in a place, I believe God will show it to him. I will not join you, sir, in the scheme that brought you here. I would give all I own to recall what I did thirty years ago."

This decided reply put an end to the newcomer's efforts to get a minister who could make more stir. There is often great power in the little word "No," but sometimes it requires not a little courage to speak it resolutely as did the silent deacon.

DEVERNE MULLEN IN CAR ACCIDENT

About midnight of Wednesday, April 1st., Song Evangelist Deverne Mullen was involved in a head-on car collision near Ithaca, New York. Deverne was travelling toward Pennsylvania to keep an appointment, and was near a motel where he planned to stay for the night, when he was struck by a truck reportedly driven by a drunken driver. Deverne's car was demolished and he was taken to Tompkins County Hospital, at Ithaca, with serious injuries. His jaw was badly fractured, several ribs were broken, there was a chest injury, and lacerations. If there are no complications, Deverne is expected to recover alright, and may be released from hospital by the time this Highway item is read. He will likely be in convalescence for two or three months, according to reports received through Paul, who went to Ithaca from Marysville, N. B., upon receiving word of the accident.

A host of friends will learn with regret of Deverne's accident, injuries, loss of his car, and temporary suspension of his fine musical ministry. It will be our earnest and united prayer that his recovery will be both speedy and complete, and that in due time he will again carry on his splendid service for the Lord.
