

A word of explanation to pastors and churches concerning regarding our foreign mission needs:

The letter in the last Highway, signed by the president of the F. M. Board, stated that funds were depleted, while the circular letter sent to churches by the Board treasurer reported a \$2500 balance. To clarify the matter and remove a seeming discrepancy, it seemed that an explanation was necessary. The \$2500 reported by the treasurer represents "special monies", sent in for specific missionary projects such as the doctor's residence to be built in Rhodesia, medical and surgical equipment for the hospital, money for a church in Africa, etc. So while this amount of money was in the foregin mission fund, it could not be used for salaries, passages, or other needs, unless as a temporary arrangement. Therefore, the \$6,000 asked for is the amount that is actually needed this month. The money sent in for the special projects referred to must be sent out early in the New Year, if not before.

Rev. Ralph Hobson, New England and Eastern Canada regional secretary of the International Christian Leprosy Mission, has been holding special services in a number of our churches, speaking of the work he represents and emphasizing missionary work in general.

Rev. Ralph Ingersoll, General Secretary of the New Brunswick Temperance Federation, was commended highly for his work by the interdenominational representation of that organization, at its annual meeting held at Lancaster, N. B., Nov. 3rd.

A new Reformed Baptist Church was organized at Houlton, Maine, Nov. 11th., with seventeen charter members. This important event will be fully reported later by the pastor, Rev. Neil Rice.

Reports of blessing and victory in the revival campaign at the Free Baptist Church of Linneus, Maine. The evangelist, Miss Sheila Graham, is serving as supply pastor at present, the former pastor, Rev. John Ruth, having resigned.

and discouraged, but I found one sister with a wondrous glory in her face and glad, sweet praises in her mouth.
