## DENOMINATIONAL-WIDE BIBLE QUIZ

The Bible Quiz is meeting with an enthusiastic response from a great many pastors, youth presidents and young people. We are anticipating a great competitive spirit throughout the Spring months. This quiz will do much to teach our young people the word of God, and will create a much needed interest in our youth work locally and denominationally.

In order to assist our pastors and youth presidents in conducting the quiz locally and to inform them on procedures to follow in order to compete with other societies, we print the following:

1. All entries must be in by Feb. 15, 1959.
2. Give all local youth an opportunity to compete for a place on local team by individual competition.
3. Each team must have 4 contestants and should have a coach and 2 substitutes.
4. The names of the 4 contestants, coach, and substitutes, if any, must be mailed to quiz headquarters by March 18.
5. After March 18, arrangements will be made by denominational youth president for each society to compete for district championship. Each society will be notified shortly after March 18, and scheduling of play-offs will be done to the best advantage of each society.
6. The official question sheet will contain 40 questions, prepared by Reformed Baptist Ministers.
7. Most of the play-offs will be on a Saturday night and will be conducted by a quiz master appointed by Denominational Y. P. Association.
8. When two teams play-off for the district championship, an effort will be made to have a district rally for one night only.
9. When preparing for play-offs, pastors and youth presidents should prepare questions and plan some practice sessions.
10. Each team will be "all out" to win every contest and local teams should do all possible to prepare thoroughly for each play-off.
