IN REMEMBRANCE

Remembrance day is a reminder of most solemn events, and noble deeds done by those who gave all they counted dear that we might be free to think, free to speak, and free to worship God.

The crosses in Flanders Field speak to us of the great price that was paid for our freedom. Young People, remember that your freedom was purchased with the price of human blood. While you are meditating upon this fact, will you also remember that your spiritual freedom was made possible at the price of blood.

In Flanders Field there are many crosses. But, there is a Cross which overshadows and outshines them all. It is the Cross of Jesus. When we hold communion around His table, it is in remembrance of Him. Jesus said, "This do in remembrance of Me."

The remembrance of Christ's Cross will remind us that it speaks to us of sin. "He became sin for us." And, "sin, when it is finished, bringeth forth death."

Christ's Cross is also a memorial of love and peace. Doctor Campbell Morgan says, "If you want to find sin at its worst, go to Calvary." This was sin which brought forth sorrow and death. This sorrow was mingled with love. These mingled together for our salvation.

It was in connection with salvation that Jesus said, "My peace I give unto you." Thus the cross speaks to us not only of sin and love, but also of peace. The Cross of Christ is the greatest memorial of peace. It speaks to us of peace for the past. All is forgiven when we confess our sins to the Christ of the Cross.

There is also peace for the present. "My peace I give unto you", said Jesus. This is the calmness that one feels in his present experience of salvation because of sins forgiven. The peace which Jesus gives is also for the future. Jesus said to one, "Go and sin no more". From this statement we conclude that Jesus gives victory over sin for all who will put their trust in Him.

Let us honor the memory of those who gave their lives for their country. Let us consecrate our lives to Jesus, and remember Him in all we do. Our Service for Christ should always be in remembrance of Him.
