WORD FROM DOCTOR EMMETT

Dear Young People,

A short while before our departure for Africa aboard the M. S. Thorscarrier, Rev. Green asked me to write a letter to you while en route; he asked Mrs. Emmett to do the same and I believe she will write to you later.

Several days ago in the late afternoon, I was standing out on deck observing the beautiful sunset over the water. The skies were similar to those seen from a hill on a lazy summer afternoon at home, but on every side as far as one could see were the gently tossing waves of the restless sea. As the shadows deepened, I felt a fresh sense of the presence and protection of God and the words of the familiar hymn came to me with a new impact: "On land or sea, what matters where? Where Jesus is, 'tis Heaven there". A deep sense of contentment and satisfaction that "this is the will of God" flooded my soul as I thought of the years of preparation now passed and, the Lord willing, the days and, yes, years of work in the service of the Master lying ahead on the mission field.

My thoughts turned then to that age-old question which as a young person I had asked myself repeatedly in seeking the will of God for my life. What constitutes a knowledge of the will of God? or, as I have been asked in recent years by sincerely questioning young people, How can I know the will of God for my life? The answers which came to my mind that afternoon were not formulated then or are they complete because the final answers rest between the individual personality and God.

(1) Possess a rich and crucial experience of full salvation. (This means being saved from your sins and being sanctified from the world.)

(2) Keep this experience fresh with a daily devotional walk. (This implies systematic Bible study, honest personal prayer, and a daily Christian witness.)

(3) Do all you can to become intelligently aware of and actively interested in the basic categories of Christian service and need. (Such as missions, home and foreign; local church services of all kinds; Christian ministry, teaching, and writing; Christian welfare; laymen's activities.)

(4) Maintain a continuous Christian discipline which places the program of God and the service of others before any and all personal commitments or desires. (Here many young people fail.)

(5) Keep an open mind, a stout heart, an obedient soul, and a steadfast faith.

You will assuredly know the will of God for your life.
