DEATHS

Mrs. Ethel Clark, 77, passed away suddenly in the Perth, N. B., hospital, January 5th, following a heart seizure. She had not been in good health for some time. Mrs. Clark was the widow of Rev. S. H. Clark, a minister of our Alliance. After Mr. Clark's death, she moved to the United States and practiced nursing. Following her retirement a few years ago, Mrs. Clark returned to Perth.

Surviving are one son, Dr. John Clark, of Binghamton, N. Y.; two sisters, Mrs. Ida McCrea, Perth, N. B., and Mrs. T. B. Morse, California, U. S. A.

The funeral service was held at the Perth Reformed Baptist Church, and conducted by Rev. S. E. Cameron. Assisting were Revs. M. Wilson and R. W. Demmings.

Rev. C. S. Hiliyard passed away at his home in Grafton, N. H., Jan. 4th at the age of 89.

The funeral was held from the Union Christian Church, East Grafton, Thursday Jan. 7th. The pastor, Harold Dodd, spoke from Ps. 90:10. Burial was in the family lot at the Grafton Centre cemetery.

Mr. Hilyard is survived by four sens. Daniel, of Bangor, Maine; Rev. Sewell, Clinton, Maine; Harry, of Attleboro, Mass; and Theodore, of Grafton. Also four daughters, Mrs. Leon Cogswell, Fort Fairfield, Me.; Mrs. P. D. Batchelder, Washington, D. C.; Mrs. P. Cross, Enfield, and Mrs. R. Fottette, Seekonk, Mass.; and one sister, Mrs. Marguerite Moulton, of Belmont, Mass.

His life with the Reformed Baptist Church began in the winter of 1893 when he was converted in revival meetings held in North Lubec, Me., by Revs. T. W. Moses and Sanford Richardson.

The following year he received his call to the ministry and began services in a school house in Dennysville, Me. He made a trip to Young's Cove, N. S., with his father, Daniel Hilyard, (who later entered the ministry) for fish. While waiting for the load, he held services there, and upon invitation returned with his wife to serve as pastor. Port Maitland and Sanford were his next field of labor. Then he moved to Berry's Mills, N. B. to pastor Lutes Mountain and part of the Millstream circuit. Back in Nova Scotia, he pastored at Finney's Cove and Annapolis Valley.

He also worked with the Free Baptist Churches at Linneus and Limenstone, Me.

After a period as Home Mission Evangelist, he pastored at Beals, Fort Fairfield, Seal Cove, St. John and Crystal-Belvedere.

In 1927 he took work with the Church of the Nazarene at North Attleboro, Mass, and later the Nazarene Church in Franklin, N. H.

The last of his active ministry was spent in evangelistic work with several of our Reformed Baptist Churches in N. B.
