Insofar as the above characteristics are valid, a student might well ask, "Has my college provided the basic raw material from which to build a proper educational perspective?" On the other hand, the college might well ask, "What are we doing to make adequate material available?"

Bethany has a unique opportunity to fulfil the role of Alma Mater (literally, Fostering Mother) to a great number of students who seek an education with a spiritual perspective. Because education without this perspective is an abstraction, i.e., something taken out of its proper context, the work of Bethany cannot be done by any secular college or high school.

Many institutions dispense facts and diplomas, but not so many are deliberately consecrated to the task of providing creative leadership in the discovery, development, and conservation of spiritual values in the lives of young people. Both in service to the denomination and in its contribution to individual students Bethany has already justified its existence. In seeking and achieving closer affiliation with a sister college the school has taken a major step which will certainly strengthen its own curricular offerings and increase its capacity to serve. A. N. Whitehead taught that education cannot be separated from "the habitual vision of greatness." Bethany, we believe, is becoming increasingly aware of the vision of its educational possibilities. In the fulfilling of this vision lies its purpose and destiny.
