Three did not return. The fourth, Mavis, had been truly saved by then and she continued to be a bright and shining light, for the Lord.

"One day she asked if she might speak in a chapel service above in her message. At that time too there were a number of Catholic teachers, at the college, studying Africaans. She wanted them to hear what she had to say too. We thank God for Navis and her consistent life before the other students, and we feel sorry for the other three who were not interested. May God yet bring them to Himself, I pray."
