

DR. AND MRS. EMMETT TO VISIT CHURCHES

Dr. and Mrs. Storer Emmett are scheduled to visit a number of our churches between the middle of August and their scheduled sailing for Rhodesia in mid-October.

The Emmetts will be feature speakers at the Missionary Rally of Riversidde Camp, Tuesday, Aug. 16th., and following the Camp Meeting they will be holding rallies at Royalton, Fort Fairfield, Crystal, Woodstock, Jonesport and Beals. Their ininerary will take them from Fort Fairfield, Maine, to Yarmouth, Nova Scotia, with meetings held in as many churches as time will allow. If a rally is not scheduled in your church, you are requested to attend and support the rally held in the church nearest to you. The Foreign Mission Board requests that special offerings be taken in each meeting toward the Emmetts' passage fund, and it is hoped that sufficient will be raised in these rallies to cover the expenses of the meetings, the Emmetts' support during the weeks preceding date of sailing, and the costs of passage to their field of service in Rhodesia.

We cannot print the schedule of meetings for August as appointments are not yet confirmed, but the points referred to above, plus proposed meeting at Calais, Maine, and Black's Harbour, N. B., make up the schedule tentatively drawn up for August. We will endeavour to have the listing of September and October meetings in the Aug. 31st. Highway.

PROGRESS ON THE MISSION FIELD

Reports of our missionary work in South Africa and Rhodesia denote continued advance on all fronts.

In the provinces of Natal and Transvaal in South Africa, more than 1,800 scholars are enrolled in Sunday Schools, and there is an enrollment of 1,100 in secular schools.

The Evangelical Holiness Bible School at Altona Mission Station had a total enrollment of 28 students last year. A new Boy's Dormitory was built, another building was renovated and remodelled to serve as a Girl's Dormitory, while another building was rebuilt to serve an a Dining Room. Two small houses were also built for married couples or teachers.

At the January Conference of the S. A. Church it was decided to publish a monthly church paper to keep the Native Church united and informed. Rev. Glendon Kierstead was appointed editor, and Rev. Charles Sanders associate editor and business manager. A committee of three natives was appointed as translaters. This paper is now in circulation.

The missionaries are encouraged and challenged with the prospects for the work in all areas. Financial support is urgently needed for needed increase of missionaries salaries, the building of new churches, and the support of a continuously expanding programme.

Reports from Rhodesia are likewise most encouraging. This new work has grown rapidly in the few years we have been promoting it. God's blessing has been upon all phases of the work, the new churches, the Sunday Schools, and the secular school work. The hospital project has been most successful. The new building is regarded as a fine unit for the beginning of this important phase of the work in that country. Already thousands of natives

have been treated at the hospital and it is anticipated that the number will increase with the arrival of Dr. and Mrs. Emmett. Rev. Harold Kierstead, regional superintendent of the Rhodesian work, suggests that we consider launching a building programme designed to double the capacity of the hospital by 1961. We are in hopes that this recommendation can be implemented.

Africa is seething with unrest. The challenge to "work while it is day" is clearly before us. We cannot curtail operations because of threats that unrest may seem to present. We must rather build and work with all speed to make the foundations of the work strong so that it will continue to function in the future regardless of political developments.

Never in the history of our missionary work has prayer support been more urgently needed. Every church and every individual interested in our missionaries and our missionary programme is requested to pledge fervent prayer support to the work in South Africa and Rhodesia during the months that lie ahead.
