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Very early in the morning the great discovery was made. Devoted disciples of Christ hasten toward the garden tomb to render what post mortem service they can. Reason seeks to turn them back by reminding them of the huge, heavy stone that had been rolled against the door of the sepulchre, but love triumphs over reason and they hurry along.

It is significant that the first to witness the signs and hear the sounds which proclaimed the Saviour's resurrection, came to the sepulchre "at the rising of the sun". Nature and grace unite in announcing to the world a new day of light and hope. As the darkness of night fled before the approach of the sun, so the "Sun of Righteousness, risen with healing in His wings" would banish darkness from the souls of men.

There were the signs of resurrection in full view. They looked, and saw that the stone was rolled away: they looked again, and discovered that Jesus' body was not in the tomb; and once more they looked, and they saw "a young man sitting on the right side, clothed in a long white garment", one whom they recognized as a messenger from the heavenly country.

And the significance of what they saw was amplified by what they heard "Ye seek Jesus of Nazareth, which was crucified: he is risen; he is not here: he goeth before you into Galilee: there shall ye see him".

Under the terrific impact of this experience "they went out quickly and fled from the sepulchre; for they trembled and were amazed, and afraid".

The signs and sounds which verify the resurrection of Christ are still abroad. The tomb is still empty: the Bible continues to proclaim the message "He is risen"; and the sense of the supernatural settles upon us whenever we review the facts contained in the Easter story.

But if the resurrection of Christ is to have a redeeming power in our lives and in our world, we must have more than signs and sounds. Historical evidences, reliable though they may be, are not sufficient to make Christ

a living, dynamic force in the world of to-day.

Something must follow or be added to the discovery of the empty tomb, the angelic announcement, the heavenly atmosphere, there must be something more. And there was! And daugdala shell m besides to saw

The most significant statement in the biblical account of the resurrection is "he appeared". First to Mary Magdalene; after that unto two of them" as they walked, and went into the country"; and "afterward unto the eleven as they sat at meat...". And after that to Thomas, to James, to "above five hundred brethren at once", and "last of all...to me also", says the apostle Paul.

It is the personal appearance of Jesus that makes his resurrection a conclusive, thrilling fact of experience It is his personal appearance to me of to-day that brings the Easter story out of the dead past into the living

The historical evidences of Christ's resurrection are essential but they are not sufficient. Men of to-day must see Christ to-day. The vital witness of the Saviour's triumph is born out of the "last of all he appeared unto me also" experience.

May Jesus himself appear to us during this Easter
