### Sussex, N. B.

It has been some time since a report has been sent in from our church, so from the Sussex Reformed Baptist Church we extend greetings to all of our Highway readers.

This year has fallen far below our expectations in some ways but in others it has been most unusual. Perhaps some things had to transpire in order to make way for the most desirable things. We have been looking for an outpouring of God's Spirit in blessing and revival that has not come yet. There has been some victory at the altar but chiefly within the church. We are very grateful for this as a church but we long to see an ingathering of the fruit that seems "ripe unto harvest". We expect to hold a week of special meetings beginning March 28, with Rev. G. R. Symonds and Cedric Landers as evangelists. By the time you read this report that effort will be history, but we are praying that it will be the history of a milestone in our church.

For the "most unusual" we mentioned: we have witnessed and enjoyed greater living comforts, this winter, than any time since coming to Sussex. Comforts that not only have been realized by the material things themselves but "these material things" speak of thoughtfulness, vision and sacrifice on the part of the people of the church which should be sufficient to gladden the heart of any preachers family.

For some time the church people has grieved over the amount we have been paying out for rent on living quarters for the pastor. At several times the thought of building had been brought up but always it seemed like too much of a venture. Last September the people "had a mind to build"! On the twenty-eighth of November we moved into our comfortable semi-ranch style home. We never felt we could afford a refrigerator in our home before: on returning to the parsonage after the Christmas concert we found a beautiful and expensive "frig" waiting for us in the kitchen with best Christmas wishes from the church. On February the fourth we had a special service in the church when the parsonage was formally dedicated to the Lord's service. There were present most of our ministers from this district; clergymen representing the Sussex and the Kings County Ministerials; the mayor of the town and Rev. Ralph Ingersoll as guest speaker. Brother Ingersoll brought a most fitting message and a social time was enjoyed at the parsonage after the service.

The Sussex Church has been under a heavy financial program but steady progress is being made in lifting the debt. A good spirit of courage prevails in our midst, and in spite of unemployment that has hit some of our members quite hard, these are all bearing up in faith and expectancy.

While we are praying, please pray with us for a revival, in our church, in your church, across our denomination and the whole world.
