BETHANY OPENS WITH A RECORD ENROLLMENT AND A REVIVAL SPIRIT

When the doors of Bethany opened to the students of 1960-61, seventy-three full-time students were registered (as compared to sixty-eight last year).

Most noteworthy aspect of registration was the enrollment of twenty-three students in the Bible department, as compared to sixteen last year and less in other years. The registration in the high school and commercial departments was forty-three and seven respectively.

This year's students came from the three geographical areas of our Church: from New Brunswick, forty-four; from Nova Scotia, twenty-one; from Maine, eight.
