If you engage Morehouse you will have no difficulty discovering where he stands on the holiness issue. He has been trained in our School, toughened in our churches, tempered to our program. Use him!

His slate is already being made up. You will need to cooperate with him in finding suitable dates. Plan on a Meeting sometime during the Year.
