WHAT CAN I DO?

You have often asked yourself, "What can I as a high school or college student do to further the cause of Christianity?" When a plea is made for money to support the various activities of the church, you have little or nothing to give. When a call is made for missionaries, and trained workers, you may be too young or unqualified to go.

But there is something important that you must do. It is your responsibility to prepare yourself for service in the future. The Apostle Paul in writing to his young friend Timothy said, "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed . . ." 2 Tim. 2:15.

Through the miracle of birth, God has given you a basic level of physical and mental ability. It is true that what a person can be is determined partly by his heredity; but what he actually becomes depends upon the attitude with which he faces his opportunities.

God has a plan for our lives. It makes no difference whether we are going to be a layman or a preacher, a teacher or a nurse, a farmer or a fisherman, a stenographer or a housewife, God has a place for us to fill.
