AFRICAN BIBLE SCHOOL

We have just received encouraging word from Rev. G. D. F. Kierstead, principal of our Evangelical Holiness Bible School in Africa. Mr. Kierstead writes that the school has shown marked progress during the past three years. The student body has increased to thirty. This enrolment would be larger if space would permit it. The Bible school will have seven graduates this year.

I was inspired with the fact that over a hundred pupils are presently enrolled in the Correspondence Department of our Bible school in Africa. These hundred pupils are taking some 160 courses.

At the present time, our Bible school is constructing a new library. This will be a valuable addition to our school; and will add much to the training of the Africans so that they might give the Gospel to their own people.

The support of the African Bible School is a major project of the Young People's Association this year. We are glad for the progress our school is making. Our young people should feel honoured to be part of this great work of being missionaries through the Bible School in Africa.
