Which is due to open on Friday evening, August 11th. This Camp continues for ten days and concludes on Sunday, August 20th. Riverside Camp is held at a secluded spot in the heart of beautiful and fertile Aroostock County in the State of Maine. The drive to this Camp is in itself a delight. The huge potato fields and the acres of ripening grain, the rolling hills and lovely farmlands, and always in the distance towering Mars Hill, provides scenic beauty of high order.

The meetings at Riverside are not as largely attended as those at Beulah, for reasons already suggested. It is quite impossible for all our ministers to leave their churches for the Alliance and Beulah Camp Meeting, and then leave again so soon for another ten-day absence. But there is a reasonably good attendance of the ministers, from fifteen to twenty, and a fair attendance of lay people.
