According to the financial statement our people have raised \$15,663.09 during this period for building purposes.

Rev. R. H. Nicholson challenged us to a greater outreach, and used our local scene as an example of what the Gospel could accomplish in other communities. The afternoon service was especially significant, with the main feature being the burning of the mortgage. Walter Rickard, treasurer of the building fund, assisted the pastor in this ceremony. Rev. B. C. Cochrane, whose vision and enthusiasm spear-headed the initial evangelistic crusade, reminded us of the glory of those beginning days, and urgently stressed the need of continual spiritual advancement. Rev. H. R. Ingersoll was with us for the day, and brought an inspiring message in the evening service.

The presence of God was evident from the beginning with excellent attendance at all services. The Sunday School record was broken with 247 present.

We were privileged to have Warren Brothers of St. John, and Mr. & Mrs. Neil MacCallum of Moncton as guest singers. They added much blessing to the occasion. Arthur Ingersoll of St. John rendered efficient service at the organ. A number of out of town guests shared in the celebration.

There is evidence of a deepening of spiritual life among the people, and a new concern for the needy souls around us. We are praying for, and expecting a harvest time. We go forward in His Name.

"The special effort has been well worth while." So commented Rev. E. W. Tokley, Highway Business Manager. He voiced the feeling of the entire Highway Committee, and a glance at the following figures will indicate the reason for our feeling so.

Out of 26 churches participating, 246 renewals were received, plus 96 new subscriptions! Total receipts stand at \$1,295.50.

The high percentage increase shown in some churches was due largely to the sheer hard work of the local agent. Our sincere thanks to each Highway agent for helping to make our special effort a success.

Doug MacCallum reported 35 renewals and 14 new subscriptions, putting Marysville in number one place by a good margin. Allan MacCallum and Mrs. Florence Ingalls brought Moncton and Seal Cove into second and third places respectively. Well done!

Percentage-wise, however, churches such as Salem, Hartland, Port Maitland, Black's Harbour and Killams Mills took the spot light. It is evident that the Highway met with new interest in these churches. Let's hope it will spread.

Black's Harbour church has emerged with the percentage lead, coming within 3 of Marysville's first place position in new subscriptions. We are glad to announce Black's Harbour's agent, Leo Wilcox, as winner of the award that has been offered by the Highway committee. He will receive a 3 year subscription to the Highway, OR free trip to Beulah Camp. Congratulations Leo!

We were disappointed that some of our churches did not participate during Highway Month. If your church didn't, we hope it will next January. We're looking for an "every church participation" then, and a still greater increase in subscription. The Highway is deserving of your church's support.
