A LETTER FROM AFRICA

Dear Young People,

Have you ever taken a boat trip? Probably most of you have ridden on a ferry or in a row boat or some other kind of water craft.

Not too long ago we were on a large ocean-going ship named the "Thorscarrier". This ship brought us to Africa.

The "Thorscarrier" is probably quite different from most of the sailing craft you have experienced. It is so equipped that people may live comfortably on it for long periods of time.

I wonder, though, how many of you have ever thought about some of the ways your life is like this great ship. I will mention just a few. No doubt you will be able to think of others. Perhaps you could use some of your ideas for a Young People's service.

This "Thorscarrier" needed a pilot. When we left St. John, N. B., it was needed a pilot to come on board to guide and steer us on a straight course away from the rocks and shoals that could damage or even destroy the vessel.

As young people we need to bow in prayer at the beginning of each day and ask Jesus to be our pilot throughout the day's activities. There are so many temptations—the rocks and shoals that would wreck our spiritual lives—that we need the Pilot's touch to daily deliver us from evil.

The "Thorscarrier" had an anchor. The day after we left St. John one of the crew became so ill that it was necessary to return him to a hospital. Word was sent back to St. John and a small boat came out to meet the returning ship and take the sailor back to shore. Our boat let down its anchor and the anchor held us firmly fixed until the small boat could reach us.

We need an anchor in our lives too. The call still comes to young people today to "present your bodies a living sacrifice" and to "come out from among them and be ye separate ... and touch not the unclean thing ..." If we will obey these commands, we may have the power of the Holy Spirit as the anchor in our lives to hold us firm and secure.

Our ship had a harbor. We landed, after about a month at sea, at Durban S. Africa. There much of the cargo was unloaded.

Our souls have a harbor. Although you are young and it seems such a long time before this will concern you, remember the Apostle James warns us, "For what is your life? It is even a vapour, that appeareth for a little while, and then vanisheth away".

Some-day we shall reach our last harbor and there we shall have to give an account. Someday our Lord will say to some, "Well done", but to others He must say, "Depart ..." We are choosing each day by the kind of cargo we carry what He will say to us. We trust that your cargo is the Fruit of the Spirit and that in "that day" our Lord will count you worthy to enter the "Haven of Rest".
