It seems almost a dream that we have been home.

How we do thank God and all our dear friends for the wonderful furlough. I guess I had almost forgotten how good the Homeland was, and even though when I left home I felt I had not had enough of Canada, I am so grateful to be able to say from the depth of my heart to-day that I have no regrets in coming back, though at times I do miss the Christian fellowship over there. It is great to be in God's will; my call to Africa never was stronger and I am so glad for the way He has led and for the willingness in my heart to obey His leadings. I do thank Him so much for a definite salvation, something we can know about and that stands the tests, mid stress and strain.

The trip back was very nice, not quite as smooth as the trip over, but God was present all the way and kept us from all harm and danger. In Halifax I had not been too well so in London we were met by a nurse and I had my first ride in an ambulance. This I did not think quite necessary but I went to the plane that way and was put in charge of the air hostess, who was the very one we had had on the plane going over, so we sort of felt that we had a friend aboard.

We had an hour's stop in Germany, Rome, Nairobi and Salisbury and did not reach Johannesburg until about two in the afternoon.

I had forgotten that our Conference would be on at that time, so only Glendon and family and some friends were there to meet us. We drove right on to Vryheid that evening and found Harold and family and several other friends there.

I stayed in Vryheid for the first week and had a nice time with the family out here. Since then I have been at St. Augustines. We were pleasantly surprised to find a family stationed here, who are evangelical. We feel this is of the Lord and trust we may have good fellowship with them.

Eugene keeps very busy at the school, as well as the weekends. A week ago he went to Louwsburg on Sat. and to Altona to attend the communion service there on Sun. About 350 miles that week end and much of it over very dusty dirt roads. Yesterday we had a short morning service in Vryheld, then had to come to St. Augustines and Eugene went on another 35 miles to Dundee, where he had been asked to speak at a Baptist fellowship meeting in the evening.

The weather has been wonderful until the past week, when snow fell at the Cape and on all the near by mountains, bringing plenty of cold to the country side.

We want to take this opportunity to again thank the Mission Board and all our dear friends, for all their kindnesses to us, during our seven months among you. It was all far beyond our expectations and our first furlough is now a wonderful memory and something that will never be forgotten.

Continue to pray for us. We know that there will be obstacles in the way, trials to meet, battles to fight but with Him we shall win—especially if you help us by prayer. We will not forget you.
