five hundred lying thus. Some laid but a few minutes, others for hours. When they arose the first words they uttered were, 'Lord, have mercy upon me.' They gradually added more, and, at length, began to exhort.

I saw about three hundred of them exhorting at one time — some of them children, who were held up in arms or on the shoulders of men. One little girl, about nine years of age, was put on a man's shoulder, and delivered, I think, a body of divinity. At length, when exhausted, she sank back upon her upholder, upon which a man who stood near affectingly said, 'Poor thing, set her down.' She replied, 'Don't call me poor; I have Christ for my brother, God for my father, and am an heir to a kingdom."


