The messenger who goes to Asia to emphasize something else than the divine and ever-living Jesus Christ, who goes there to air his doubts or speak with uncertain sound before men who are already bothered with an excess of uncertainties, would better have stayed at home.

By preaching the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, and preaching it in that love which is wise in distinguishing things that are great and essential from those that are trivial and secondary, the church will magnify the power of its testimony.

The Christianity needed must be wise and patient and sympathetic, hospitable to all truth and friendly to all goodness, and first of all it must have in it the life blood of the old evangel which Paul carried to Rome. It must be able to produce Christians who have nerve and fiber to make sacrifices and endure hardships.

This world of ours needs Christ, not a partial Christ, not a Savior who has no almighty power to save, but the Christ of the Gospel, the one unique feature and element of Christianity, the Christ of the Cradle and the Throne,
