By preaching the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, and preaching it in that love which is wise in distinguishing things that are great and essential from those that are trivial and secondary, the church will magnify the power of its testimony.

The Christianity needed must be wise and patient and sympathetic, hospitable to all truth and friendly to all goodness, and first of all it must have in it the life blood of the old evangel which Paul carried to Rome. It must be able to produce Christians who have nerve and fiber to make sacrifices and endure hardships.

This world of ours needs Christ, not a partial Christ, not a Savior who has no almighty power to save, but the Christ of the Gospel, the one unique feature and element of Christianity, the Christ of the Cradle and the Throne,

the Christ of the Cross and the broken Sepulcher; the loving, suffering, atoning, risen and ever-living Son of God.
