Over Seven Thousand in Service

There are about 7,000 Nazarenes serving in the armed forces, according to the Nazarene Servicemen's Commission, of which Paul Skiles is director. Adding their wives and children, the Commission reaches about 15,000 persons, Skiles estimates.

About 500 Nazarene pastors near military installations work with the service families. A total of about 50,000 contacts a year is made.

There are 27 Nazarenes on active duty as chaplains: 11 in the army; 9, navy; 5, air force; and 2 in the Veterans' Administration. Latest promotions: In the navy, Henry W. Stroman to lieutenant commander; army —Lyle W. Robinson to major, and George C. Laurie and Herbert J. Van Vorce to lieutenant colonel.—N.I.S.

Hoover Says 1960 Crime Rate Highest in History

Washington, D. C. (EP)—J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has reported that the year 1960 was the blackest in the crime annals of the United States.

The crime rate, which has risen ominously for the past decade, increased by 14 per cent during the year. Some 1,861,000 serious crimes were reported to police an increase of 230,870 over the previous record set in 1959.

The number of crimes committed in 1960 almost doubled the number of offenses reported to police in 1950, for an actual increase of 98 per cent over the past decade.

Since the population has gained only 18 per cent in this period, this means that the crime rate per capita is now 66 per cent greater than 10 years ago.


Scriptures Now in 1,165 Tongues

New York (EP)—The American Bible Society has announced that in 1960 Scripture portions were published for the first time in five more languages of primitive peoples, bringing the number of languages in which some portion of the Scriptures has been translated to 1,165.

Although the Society estimates that the Scriptures have not been translated in some 1,500 languages and dialects, only some 10 per cent of the world's population speaks a tongue in which some Scripture portion has not yet been published.

Graham Ends Greater Miami Crusade

Miami Beach, Fla. (EP)—The final rally of the Billy Graham Greater Miami Crusade ended here with 18,500 persons jamming Convention Hall. The attendees heard, besides Dr. Graham's sermon "Will God Spare America?", a request from President Kennedy asking the evangelist to pray for America. Sen. George Smathers (Dem.-Fla.) interrupted his meeting with President Kennedy and Prime Minister Harold Macmillan to be at the rally. He reported the Chief Executive as saying, "Tell Billy to pray for us."

Others enrolled in lecture courses in theory of music and music appreciation. Several hopefully sought a place in the school choir.

Saturday evening a reception was held for the staff and students providing an opportunity for all to become acquainted with one another. The Y.M.C.A. banquet room provided a pleasant setting for the program and refreshments.

On Sunday the day ended with spiritual blessing as three students sought the Lord and others received help. Others evidently were under conviction.

Thus the year began as one of promise — with a good spirit prevailing in the school and an evidence of co-operation on the part of the students.
