presence, real, caring, comforting, strengthening, chiding, rebuking, ever present, ever able, ever willing.

Do you know what it is to love a friend or a relative who is absent? The only contact with whom may be by way of letters, if at all? Do you know what it is to sense the presence of one whom you have "loved long since and lost awhile?" Do you also know what such experiences can do to keep one's heart true and free from alien affections? Not all who have experienced separation from loved ones have been able to maintain the sense of their reality and unbroken devotion to them. Perhaps the greatest tragedies of war have been the vows broken by distance and love shattered by absence, when a form that was near became more meaningful, though loved less, than the true love who could only be retained in heart through faith's strong cord.

My own mother passed away more than thirty years ago. Knowing my sorrow and aloneness a lady, widowed by the loss of husband and two sons, sought to be a mother to me. She even asked that I accord her the title. But that I could not do in spite of all she meant to me over a period of twenty years. And today there is a reality about my mother that continues to linger. It is more than a physical recollection, because I go at times to a photograph to refresh my memory of her face and form. But the mother who lingers is the one who gave her wee son to God in an hour of severe physical crisis; who, in the midst of great suffering sang softly at her house work or sat at the old pedal organ playing hymns in the darkness when church attendance was denied her; whose faith in God was more constant than spectacular; who declared that she wasn't hungry in the pinch of lean winters so that her children could eat; and who slipped away home one day to the strains of "O Lamb of God I come."

No one but a skeptic of the deepest dye would attempt to rob me of this reality of my mother's presence. By the rehearsal of the experience, faith in the reality of the presence of Christ springs up anew. If human ties can be so strong and if their severance only gives way to a stronger "tie that binds," how much more should the
