GENERAL INVITATION

The public is cordially invited to attend the graduation activities of 1961 and it is hoped that a large number will come from Maine, New Brunswick, and Nova Scotia.

Extra preparations have been made to encourage the graduates' parents, our ministers, alumni, and friends to come.

ACCOMMODATIONS

The School has taken the initiative to provide accommodations at very reasonable rates. Over two dozen rooms are available in tourist homes and inns within five to ten-minutes-walking distance of the School (not to mention hotels and motels.) The rates are as low as \$1.50 per person per night (\$3.00 per couple). The rates do not exceed \$5.50 with bath per couple.

If guests will write our Business Manager a few days in advance he will make reservations for them. (They should state the type of accommodations required and the prices anticipated).

Good meals are available in Yarmouth at reasonable prices; full dinners can be purchased as low as seventy-five cents.

Train and bus make connections to and from the Digby boat. TCA connections between St. John and Yarmouth are fast (forty minutes) and reasonable (\$20.00 round trip).

PROGRAM

All the activities of the weekend are open to visitors. Visitors who wish to attend the Banquet may purchase tickets for \$1.50, unless they have complimentary tickets from a graduate. As the number attending the Banquet may have to be limited, visitors who wish to attend should write in advance.

The Banquet is a gala occasion in a decorated hall with pretty table settings. The Banquet program includes the class history, will, and prophecy besides other features.

The speaker at the baccalaureate service will be Rev. E. A. M. Kierstead, M.A., Field Superintendent of our southern African missions. The speaker at the graduation will be Rev. Dr. Harvey J. S. Blaney, a professor in the department of religion at Eastern Nazarene College, Quincy, Massachusetts.
