prepared to accept the more rigorous demands of disciple-ship.

Many at certain times have been overwhelmed with the glamour and the glory of being a Christ follower. The challenge of gospel spreading has always been appealing. Strong motivating factors are there which cannot be denied—the heathen dying in fear and darkness, the shepherdless masses groveling in their sin and debauchery, the ever unfulfilled need for talented, trained, and wholly consecrated workers. Yes, but wait a moment. Have we yet come to grips with the more basic realities? Do we know what lies beneath the glamour and the glory?

Thomas à Kempis put it this way, "Jesus has many lovers of his kingdom, but few bearers of his Cross." Truer words were never uttered. The crux of the matter is here. For to follow Christ involves specific demands and disciplines which, under the most ideal conditions, cannot be pleasant. They are there and we cannot escape them.

I. IN HUMILITY

Is it not so that the most difficult thing in all the world is to humble oneself?

It was more by chance that when God declared his covenant with Solomon, II Chron. 7:14, that humility was the number one requirement. God said, "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves..." As fundamental as are "prayer," "seeking my face," and "turning from our wicked ways," humility rightly precedes them. God refuses to show interest until he sees a humble heart.


Jesus led the way here. We cannot do less than to follow. St. Paul gave us dramatic insight into this truth in that great kenosis passage, Phil. 2:5-9. The step from the divine to the human—from God to man—was a humbling one. Finite minds shall never grasp the mystery of it. The best we can observe suggests that this was done at awful cost. But this was only the beginning. St. Paul continues, "And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross." What humility! The depths of humility were plumbed when Jesus became humanity's scapegoat. The total span of Jesus' life—from manger to cross—was a continuing story of humiliation. St. Paul set the pace for Christ's followers when he said, "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus."

Pride, humility's opposite, is the great enemy. Cut it in seven pieces, and each piece survives to haunt men further. When Satan runs out of things to make men proud about, he persuades them to be proud that they are humble (a most devilish kind of pride), or to be proud that they are not as other men, or even to be proud that they are orthodox. When God listed his most hated things "a proud look" topped the list (Prov. 6:17).

The Psalmist said, "God forgetteth not the cry of the humble." Is not this where we need help? A genuine humbling of ourselves before God—both pastor and people—would do more for us today as a denomination than any other one thing. Are we willing to do it? James said, "Humble yourselves in the sight of the Lord, and he shall lift you up." Let us follow Christ in humility!

II. IN LOVE

If one is humble, it is easy to love. A selfish or a proud person cannot love, for all affection has been directed to himself. Again, Jesus has shown us the way. Men approached Jesus without fear—the rich and the poor, the wise and the ignorant, children and invalids. How dared they approach him in such confidence? The answer lies in the fact that he loved them all. Jesus did not just tolerate men; he loved them, and they knew it.
