HITHERTO HENCEFORTH

I Sam. 7:12 "... Hitherto hath the Lord helped us."
II Tim. 4:8 "Henceforth there is laid up for me a crown of righteousness ..."

A woman, serving alone as a missionary among the foothills of the Himalyas of India, had a missionary friend pay her a brief visit. When the time came to separate, the two were reluctant to leave, each dreading the awful loneliness that so soon would surround their lives. As they parted, finally, the missionary friend turned to wave farewell and said, "Hitherto." Instantly the answer came back, "Henceforth." These parting words, reminding each of them of God's never failing care in the past and His glad promise for the future, had become customary as the two met from time to time.

"Hitherto . . . henceforth." Wonderful words! Words which measure all time and which embrace in their span the total record of God's dealings with men.

"Hitherto" is a look into the past. It covers the record of history, of our yesterdays. It includes our battles, our disappointments, our struggles, our victories. It reveals God's unchanging purposes for us in Christ, that in Him we might "have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of his grace," that in Him we might have "inheritance among them which are sanctified." It declares to us that "we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world." The story of the past proves the amazing truth of Joshua's valedictory address in which he stated, "Not one thing hath failed of all the good things which the Lord your God spake concerning you; all are come to pass unto you, and not one thing hath failed thereof" (Joshua 23:14).

The prophet Samuel said, "Hitherto hath the Lord helped us!" Indeed, what a great God we serve. We have proved that His love is boundless and His grace without measure.

"Henceforth" is a look into the future. For the Apostle Paul it meant that down the road just a short way was his promotion day, with "a crown of righteousness" a fitting reward for faithful service. For us it may mean the opportunity to serve the Lord a while longer, or with Paul, it may mean our crowning day also. It may mean sorrow and heartbreak. It may mean heavy burdens and perplexing problems. It may mean triumph or it may mean tragedy. Whatever the future, this is certain, that it glows with divine radiance and spiritual assurance. For God is

a part of "henceforth" and God knows no equal. He knows no defeats. Praise His Name!

Today we stand still for a moment. The old year is passing away; the new is before us—untried, unknown, uncertain. Our best inspiration and our surest guidance will be found in the Lord who hitherto hath led us on. Henceforth He knows the way.

HATS OFF TO E. H. B. S.

This issue of The Highway carries a picture of four native graduates of Evangelical Holiness Bible School, Altona, along with a write-up of most impressive graduation exercises held early in November.

With a history of less than seven years, our own training school for native preachers and workers has made signal progress. Its contribution to the African Missionary Program has already been great and the present trend of growth and development suggests that it will increase more and more.

The student body has had a consistent growth. New and improved facilities have been necessary and new courses have been added to the school curriculum. The latest addition has been a lighting plant, installed by Brother Glendon Kierstead, making possible a lighting capacity of 750 watts. The system was made possible by a used airplane generator, a petrol-paraffin engine, plus creative ingenuity.

Brother Kierstead has appealed through the Highway Editor for support for students at the cost of \$50. per year. Several Missionary Auxiliaries are already supporting students at E.H.B.S. He also wishes to establish a new course in Domestic Science during the coming school year which will be primarily for lady students. Mrs. Betty Kierstead, who has obtained a certificate in Designing and Dressmaking, will teach the course. The cost for introducing the course will be approximately \$250. Any takers?

For a job well done, we say "Hats Off" to the Principal, Rev. Glendon Kierstead, his staff, and E.H.B.S. graduates of 1961.
