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fellowship in "brotherhood" in sessions where clouds of tobacco smoke fill the house and where many times liquor flows freely.

It should be stressed that while the alleged basis of such lodge organizations is religious, it is not Christian. The leading lodge in point of prominence and membership states in its constitution that since its members are now "found in all nations even of divers religions, they are now generally charged to adhere to that religion in which all men agree (leaving each brother to his own particular opinion)." It is described as "a worship in which all good men may unite that each may share the faith of all." Such a position falls far short of the truth of Him who said, "No man cometh unto the Father, but by me" (John 14:6).

Utterly damning, from the Christian point of view, is the frequently made claim that if a man honestly believes in a Supreme Being and strives to live by his faith, "he will be received into the all-perfect, glorious and celestial lodge above, for he will, by his life, have made of earth the porch-way entrance to Heaven." The presence of the Bible and an altar can never in a thousand years sanctify such rank humanism and shallow religious philosophy.

Certainly there is no reason to minimize the social and community service which many of these organizations undertake. But service of this kind does not depend upon either the secrecy or the quasi-religious character of the group. There are many service organizations doing similar work whose whole operation is a matter of public record.

If anything, the fifty-four years which have passed since the union at Pilot Point have but verified the wisdom of the founding fathers in mentioning as one of the practices to be avoided by members of the Church of the Nazarene "membership in or fellowship with oath-bound secret orders or fraternities."

An Ever-fresh Experience

Too Many of us are living upon past experience religiously. We hear people say sometimes, "I was brought up a Free Methodist," as though they had never had anything to do with their denominational allegiance. It would seem that they have felt the religious opinions and faith of those who handled them in their early years had been accepted without a personal appropriation.

But religion was meant to be something vital in human experience. The truly spiritual man knows himself to be in daily contact with God, and he knows his religious experience to be a reality. Some of us are inclined to think, because we answered the call of God long ago, we have answered once and for all. It would surprise us to be told that we are far away from God. We are living upon a past experience only.

This is so often true of those who approach middle life. They have become so engrossed in material pursuits their interest in God's will has waned. There is a destruction that wasteth at noonday. They make a variety of excuses. But they have ignored the sadder truth that they have not gathered the manna of religion fresh daily. They have lived so far from God that He is not so real to them as once He was. They have not gathered a new experience of Him to meet the hunger of the present.
