

We cannot promote a missionary programme with dollars, but we cannot do so without them. Prayer is more important than giving, but prayer alone is not enough.

Missionaries must have money to live and work. Mission Boards must have money to operate and promote the missionary enterprise.

If missionaries are to be sent to the fields to which God has called them, plane and boat fares must be provided. For those who answer the call of need in lands afar, homes must be built, cars purchased, living expenses met. To teach and train the natives, schools must be erected and supported. The physical ills of the undernourished, the diseased, and the afflicted of the mission field, call for the building of hospitals, the provision of medical and surgical equipment, the ministry of doctors and nurses. If those who receive the Gospel are to be cared for, churches must be built and kept in repair.

There are unnumbered needs related to missionary work that can only be met as consecrated people give generously of their means. If giving stops, so does the
