

— Editorial — THE CROSS

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The message of "The Cross" brings to the Easter season an added richness as well as richness to the significance of the gospel. This is revealed in the gardenprayer in Gethsemane. It is also revealed in events of passion week so closely connected with this climactic event in the garden.

The fact that Jesus prayed is significant. But, that Jesus prayed as He did is of supreme worth. To understand "The Cross" in His prayer in the Garden, one must go back to Palm Sunday and His triumphant entry into Jerusalem. There Jesus revealed His kingship and accepted the same. This event, overshadowed later by the moments in the Upper Room, revealed the true significance of the Cross. In the Upper Room, Jesus outlined the virtues of His body and of His blood in symbolic form when He said, "My body which is broken for you", and the cup as, "the New Testament in My blood which is shed for you." These symbolisms spoke of death — Cruel death. They also spoke of victory through death.

With the spiritual significance of these symbols in mind; and with the physical consequence of making them a reality, Jesus went to Gethsemane to pray. Because of these facts, the essence of His prayer was cross-bearing. It was with the cross in mind that Jesus prayed, "If it be possible, let this cup (of Suffering and Shame) pass from Me." But His cross was born by His willingness to have His Father's will performed in His life.

There is a sense in which Jesus bore His cross in the Garden. He suffered the pangs of its reality. Its anguish, its torment and its pressure were all thrust upon the master in the Garden as he prayed. Doubtless it was these pressures which caused Him to sweat great drops of blood which were so filled with virtue.

While the brook Cedron had not failed to physically separate Jesus' bearing of His cross in prayer in Gethsemane and the place of actual crucifixion, it could not separate the significance of the two events, both of which foreshadowed the principle of redemption—The giving of life for the sake of the gospel. It was in prayer that Jesus bore His cross.

"Must Jesus bear the cross alone, And all the world go free! No, there's a cross for ev'ry one, And there's a cross for me."
