NAZARENE GIVING IS CITED BY UNITED PRESS INTERNATIONAL

The per capita giving in the Church of the Nazarene. highest in the nation among Protestant churches with 100,000 or more members, was emphasized in a recent feature-length article.

It was written by Mrs. Claire Cox, religion writer of the news service, United Press International. It was made available to all of its member newspaper clients and published coast to coast, and in Alaska and Hawaii.

"Whenever church statistics are tabulated," she wrote, "the 320,000 members of the Church of the Nazarene rank among the most generous of American Protestants."

Other excerpts follow:

"Many Nazarenes far exceed the traditional tithe, which is 10 per cent of all income.

"The major Nazarene impulse to give apparently stems from the fact that when one is a member of the church, he is a member every day of the week. His entire life becomes involved. Therefore, giving to it is most natural . . .

"The dynamism of the Nazarene denomination is found also in its concentration on mission work and evangelism. More money goes into these efforts than into the erection of imposing church buildings . . .

"The Nazarenes adhere to all the historic doctrines of the New Testament and emphasize the doctrine of entire sanctification as a second definite work of grace . . .

"Nazarenes are involved in an intensive program to gain at least 70,000 new members and start 800 more churches by 1964."—N.I.S.

Portugal Closes Protestant Church and agency and all

LISBON, Portugal (EP). — An Assemblies of God church near here has been closed by Portuguese authorities on grounds that it held services in a building not licensed for that purpose.

The church, serving a constituency of some 2,000 people, was the second Protestant organization adversely affected by the government in one week. Observers reasoned that the action was taken as an aftermath of Protestant accusations against Portuguese authorities there.

Work Among the Indians

Springfield, Me.—Eighty per cent of evangelical work accomplished on Indian reservations in the United States is sponsored by the Assemblies of God, according to a recent National Association of Evangelical's survey. They are reaching Indians in 19 states, and the past year had over 800 adherents to the faith. The denomination has 148 missionaries to the American Indians and over 110 preaching points.

SPRINGFIELD, Mo.—The Assemblies of God has recently completed an unprecedented city-wide evangelistic revival in Rome, Italy, the first to be held in the modern history of the ancient city.

"The entire city was stirred," according to observers. Newsreel cameramen photographed highlights of the services. As a result, motion pictures of the campaign were shown in theaters of Rome and all over Italy. Daily newspapers carried stories of the unprecedented effort.

In addition to hundreds who publicly professed conversion, others testified to receiving miracles of healing.

More than 100,000 copies of the Gospel of St. John and Bible courses for converts were distributed to persons attending the services. Assemblies of God ministers in the area report increased attendances in churches since the campaign began.
