So you are afraid to witness! Most of us have that common and normal characteristic. He is our strength in our weakness. However, our fear has kept us silent too long and I cannot help but feel it is because we don't know how. Perhaps we have had the idea that each person to whom we witness must be given a sermon. Such is not the case, and furthermore, the Lord does not expect that — He desires that we be instant in season.

PLAN to witness. Memorize God's word and endeavour to use it when opportunities come — they will! When you converse with an elevator operator, you may say, "some day I'm going up and I'm not coming back". (Make sure you are on the way up!) That is enough and you are being instant in season. Again, you may be talking to someone about your recent advancement, so all you need to say is, "God has been very good to me". Little things make big channels of blessing.
