COMMENTARY

"Let patience have her perfect work, that ye may be perfect and entire, wanting nothing," (James 1:4)

A perfect believer is one who lacks nothing in his religion, though he may lack many other things. A pure heart is an unmixed heart—the graces existing without their opposite evils; meekness whout pride; patience without fretting; love without anger and faith without unbelief.

"Now the end of the commandment is charity out of a pure heart, and of a good conscience, and of faith unfeigned." (1 Tim. 1:5)

Divine Love filling a pure heart will enable us to perfectly keep the ten commandments. Purity of heart is the only method of fulfilling this law.

"Flee also youthful lusts: but follow righteousness, faith, charity, peace, with them that call on the Lord out of a pure heart." (2 Tim 2:22)

Notice the expression, "love and peace . . . out of a pure heart". There is a degree of love and peace before the heart is fully sanctified; but we do not meet the requirements of the Bible until we love and pray out of a pure heart.
