It is thrilling to know that Mother was an inspiration to many. We shall miss her letters and prayers. May God raise up many who will take up the challenge of the prayer life, and the ministry of correspondence: to keep the field informed of the challenge and progress in the homeland. We long for news of the home church just as much as you long for news of the foreign field. As you pray for us we pray for you, and letters help to a more intelligent prayer life.

As an expression of special respect and endearment, the Africans call all your lady Missionaries "Mother." But like other nations the Africans reserve a special tribute to those who have departed to the next life: So Gladys Kierstead is referred to as "Mother" and Rev. E. H. Sanders as "Grandmother," of the African church.

At our recent African Alliance, at Altona M. S., brother Bill Morgan was in charge of a memorial service, to the relatives of your Mission staff. Seven relatives of your Missionaries and African workers (three Africans) were thought of in that service. Near the close of this service opportunity was given for all who desired to offer themselves to work for the Lord. I believe there were nine Africans who stood to declare their desire and willingness to work for the Lord.
