## FROM THE GORMANS

Dear Highway Friends;

It has been good to read letters and articles from many of our Churches and Pastors, and the encouraging reports of revival and blessing at home have been an inspiration to us in this part of the vineyard.

To date there has been nothing heard about Alliance or Beulah Camp, so we are anticipating hearing from our friends and receiving their personal comments in addition to the excellent report usually published at the end of July.

We have returned home from the Annual African Alliance which was held in Louwsburg this year. It is not for me to report in great detail about it, but it was a time of blessing in spite of very cold weather and several days of high winds. We were able to charter a bus to take most of the Workers and Delegates from Hartland, Calvary, and Paulpietersburg and this made the 75 mile trip more comfortable and less expensive than it would have been otherwise.

There is a possibility that our Minister at Calvary will be moving this year, and if so, making other moves necessary as well. We would ask you to pray for Divine Guidance in these matters. Our African Churches do not "call" their ministers as at home, largely because they do not support them either, but we always seek the Lord's Will before either suggesting or allowing any moving of personnel. There is a great shortage of African preachers right now, but the number we can take on is limited by the support available for them.

Our local preacher in the Location is asking for additional Sunday School Facilities to accommodate the 200 plus he has enrolled. We hope to get our present Church Site enlarged a bit before attempting any further building, and the local Church will probably be able to finance the job. We were asked to start a Clinic here too, but are waiting word from the local Dutch Reformed Church as to whether or not they are interested in co-operating as they did at Louwsburg. A Swedish Baptist Mission has already promised to join with us in this much-needed venture, and the Town Board is willing to help out, IF we can organize a Committee to be responsible for it.

Our Vryheid European Work is continuing, and a few ones have attended some of the Services. The Building Lot is over half paid for, but we do not expect to be able to start any building this year, unless it would be a small hall at the rear of the Lot which could serve as a temporary Church.

This letter is now too long, so we will bring it to a close with the hope that it finds everyone enjoying good health and God's blessing.
