## "CLOSED ON SUNDAY"

On a beautiful Sunday evening as I was walking to church, I traveled past a place of business that had a sign, "Closed on Sunday," in the large window.

I didn't think much about it until I came to God's House. Suddenly I realized what would be my reaction if I found a similar notice on the church door. My heart became heavy, for I thought I saw this notice tacked on the church door:

"This ——— church closed on Sunday evenings because:

"1. My people are unconcerned. They feel more comfortable in their easy chairs at home watching TV.

"2. Their meager dollar will not pay for the lights and the heat.

"3. My people are too exhausted after washing, ironing, cleaning, mowing the lawn, and other odd jobs done over the week end.

"4. I cannot do all the things the congregation feels I should do with the salary they pay me as pastor.

"5. It's too many miles from home for my people to travel."

There were still more reasons, but I was not able to read them, for my eyes were blurred. Then I noticed another paragraph:

"This church was built by Faith, and dedicated to the Lord. It was the place where everyone was welcome, and where the power of the Holy Spirit was felt. Folks took time to have fellowship with other Christians, to give God thanks for His many blessings. Here people were saved, sanctified, and went out rejoicing because of the privilege of public worship.

"Today people have grown disobedient to the Word of God, so these doors have had to close on Sunday night . . . , and will perhaps remain so until revival fires begin to burn in each heart.

"Signed: Rev. Much Concerned."

Thank God, those were only a few moments of fear. Arriving at my destination, I found the church doors open, the faithful few were there in their pews, God's presence and His Spirit were felt, the warmth of love penetrated my heart and soul in a way that it had not done before. As I sat down I said, "Thank Thee, Lord, for this opportunity of worship. And may I never be found guilty of having a part in the closing of any church door."

## NEW WESLEYAN-ARMINIAN BIBLE COMMENTARY

A 6-volume set of Bible commentaries within the Wesleyan-Arminian tradition is now in preparation. The design is evangelical, expository, practical, homiletical and devotional. It is titled **The Wesleyan Bible Commentary**.

The editorial board consists of Charles W. Carter, general editor, Ralph Earle, and W. Ralph Thompson. Contributors include 20 leading Bible scholars. The advisory board includes Paul Rees, L. R. Marston, Paul Petticord, Hugh Benner, Everett Cattell, R. S. Nicholson, Paul Elliott, and George Failing.

The first volume, covering the 4 Gospels, is being produced by Ralph Earle and Harvey J. S. Blaney. It will go to press within the present year. The second and third volumes of the New Testament will be published in 1964. The Old Testament will then follow. The Wm. B. Eerdmans Co. is the publisher.
