The real security of Christianity is also to be found IN THE CONSOLATION WHICH IT BEARS TO EVERY HOUSE OF MOURNING. How wonderfully true! One of the saddest tales I ever read to picture the darkness of heathenism was an article entitled "The Land of covered Faces." A missionary was able to bring the message of the Gospel to this poor woman and told her that in Christian countries there was no such custom. This the woman gladly did; hope sprang up in her heart; her tears were dried, and she rejoiced in the hope of seeing her loved one's face again.

What but Christianity could have offered such hope and consolation to this sad-hearted mother!

THE SECURITY OF CHRISTIANITY IS TO BE FOUND in the light with which it brightens the great mystery of the grave.

Yes, there is mystery about the grave! What light we have comes from the Bible. What meaning would life have if it ended at the grave? It would have no meaning! Our Gospel light brightens and gives meaning to the life here and hereafter.

How sad indeed would be the house of mourning, how dark indeed the grave, if Jesus had not left us with the Gospel message! He Said, "I am the resurrection and the life." He also said, "I am the Light of the world; he that followeth me shall not walk in darkness, but shall have the light of life."

No truth of the New Testament was more thoroughly established than the truth of the resurrection. Christianity is unique in that it rejoices and builds its hopes for the future on the fact of an empty tomb.

St. Paul in 1 Cor. 15 makes very clear the importance and also the certainty of the resurrection, and gives the believer much to cheer and comfort and to be happy about. Let us all find hope in Jesus Christ and rest in the blessed hope that one day we shall see Him as He is. Says Paul, "Behold I show you a mystery; we shall not all sleep, but we shall all be changed. In a moment, in the twinkling of an eye, at the last trump: for the trumpet shall sound, and the dead shall be raised
