This gives you some idea of the growth of our youth work since both of these churches entertained the rally quite comfortably several years ago. We would appreciate any comments on this "split" idea for 1964.

This year's rally promises to be a grand rally. We were fortunate to be able to engage Rev. Quintin J. Everest, South Bend Indiana, as special speaker. Mr. Everest is one of the best speakers we have heard, so we are assured of excellent preaching.

Special music will be provided by the former Barker's Point Trio, Moncton's Male Quintet and the Bethany choir. These will assure us of the best in music.

We were able to rent the Marysville school auditorium for our rally, which we believe is an answer to prayer, and the work of William LaPoint and Douglas MacCallum. This auditorium seats from 500 to 600 people. This will be a great asset to our rally.

Hundreds of our young people from various areas of our denomination are looking forward with anticipation to our Spring Rally which is the greatest event in the youth work of our church.
