Rev. and Mrs. Hollis Kimball and family took up residence at East Ferry in July 1962.

The picture presented to them was not one of ease for these veteran Home Mission warriors. However, they faced the task before them with enthusiasm and determination.

Faced with the realization that this would be the last year the church could expect monthly support for their pastor from the Home Mission Board, they challenged the people to a greater effort to pay their remaining debts and face the challenges of the new year.

At a recent meeting of the church and interested friends, it was decided that some immediate work should be done on the parsonage and church. The parsonage, that will be debt free this year, is to be painted along with other repairs. The church is to be painted and additional pews installed, also landscaping is to be done.

The debt on the church was taken care of in what one could say was a miracle. Perhaps it can be best described in the following poem by Victor Freeman of our Digby church.

"There is a holiness church in Nova Scotia, That was burdened and buried in debt, And after five years from the building, They could not pay a preacher yet.

## DIGBY

The spirit of this district towards Home Mission work is commendable. For several years the churches of Woods Harbor, Port Maitland, Sandford, Yarmouth and Havelock paid equal amounts for rental of a hall for services in Digby.

These churches agreed to carry on their support for five years. On the basis of their commitment, a loan was made to build a church there. A generous response followed this offer. Ministers and laymen volunteered to do the work. A number of our men from the Havelock church gave lumber, another man gave \$500.00, another \$100.00, and a boy who couldn't give a day's work, gave a sacrificial gift of \$10.00. Arrangements were made to purchase a piano for the new church and a truck was borrowed to transport it. The owner of the truck asked if the piano was paid for. On being informed that it wasn't, he not only loaned us the truck free of charge but paid cash for the piano. Outstanding contributions of labor came from Glen McCrea of St. Stephen, N. B., who took part of his vacation to work on the church and Rev. Ronald Madden, pastor of North Head Church, who gave two weeks of voluntary labor.

In November 1962 a new church building was dedicated in Digby.

Rev. and Mrs. Hazen Ricker will take up pastoral duties there this coming July.

P.S. Recently on the strength of a woman's willingness to use her bond for collateral, a loan was made and a parsonage will be built or bought before the new church year. Thus the Lord has enabled us to have both church and parsonage.
