REV. D. M. MacDONALD PASSES

Funeral Services for the late Rev. D. M. MacDonald (Paulpietersburg) were held from the Apostolic Faith Church, Vryheid, Natal, South Africa, on Friday afternoon, August 30, 1963, with Rev. Karl Gorman officiating.

Brother MacDonald, who had been in poor health for some time, was admitted to the Vryheid Hospital on August 21, and passed quietly away on the morning of August 28th., only a week before his 75th. birthday. Mrs. MacDonald (the former Faith Sanders) was admitted to Hospital on the same day as her husband, but was allowed to return home the day of the funeral.

Favorite hymns of the deceased sung by the large congregation were, "Majestic Sweetness" and "It Is Well With My Soul". Mrs. K. L. Hanson of the Assemblies of God Mission, and a personal friend of the MacDonalds, sang as a special request "Sweet Will of God".

Dr. Esselstyn, Superintendent of the Church of the Nazarene in South Africa, spoke warmly and highly of the association he had enjoyed for many years with our late Brother, beginning with the time they were students together at Eastern Nazarene College in Wollaston, Massachusetts.

Assisting as Pallbearers were Reverends William Morgan, Glendon Kierstead, Charles Sanders and Hans Persson, (Swedish Baptist Mission) as well as David Titlestad, brother-in-law, and David Lombard, a personal friend of the family.

Interment was in the Vryheid Cemetery, with Rev. Charles Sanders offering Prayer, and the Benediction by Rev. K. L. Hanson.

From beginning to end, the Service was marked by a Spirit of Victory, and the singing was most inspirational and uplifting, as the Holy Spirit of God drew near to bless and encourage the sorrowing ones and the great number of Christian Workers who had gathered.

Brother MacDonald was Ordained to the Ministry of the Reformed Baptist Church in 1928, just over 35 years ago, and came to the Mission Field the following year. He served as Superintendent of our Work until 1941, and was able to gain Government Recognition for our Church, as well as Financial Grants for some of the Schools and Hartland Mission Native Hospital. In more recent years, his Mission Work was limited by the infirmities of old age, but he was a faithful supporter of our European Work in Vryheid, and loyal to the preaching of Holiness.

It is our prayer that the Lord will bless Sister Mac-Donald in her writing and translation work, and guide the lives of the son Daniel, and daughter Mary Ella.
