ROAD TOLL BLAMED ON ALCOHOL

Last Saturday, Sunday and Monday 31 persons lost their lives on Quebec roads. The previous weekend — the long July 1 holiday — 30 others also died on provincial highways (about half of the Canadian total). And the week before — the St. Jean Baptiste long weekend — 21 were killed. A grim Quebec total of 82.

Tonight another weekend begins.

Yesterday, Municipal Court Chief Judge Roland Paquette, in commenting on the traffic carnage in the province said: "If we had as many deaths in an epidemic there would be a general panic among the citizenry."

The remarks were made as he sentenced two motorists to jail without the option of a fine for impaired driving.

The chief judge blamed alcohol for the unusually high death toll. "There's too much mixing of gasoline and alcohol," he said in announcing his decision to impose jail terms for motorists convicted of impaired or drunken driving. "A motorist under the influence of liquor is more dangerous than a pistol in the hands of a holdup man," he said. "In my opinion only jail terms without the option of a fine will awaken motorists to the dangers of driving with their faculties impaired by alcohol."

DEATHS

Rev. Handley C. Mullen, 77, a minister of the Reformed Baptist Church for fifty years, passed away at the Victoria General Hospital, Halifax, on August 26, following a stroke. He had been a resident of Port Maitland, N. S. for the past eight years.

Born at Easton, Digby Co., N. S. in 1886, son of Hartshorn and Mary (Sabeen) Mullen, Mr. Mullen was ordained to the Christian ministry in 1913 at Beulah Camp, Brown's Flat, N. B. Married the same year to Ethel Ring Sabine, Riverdale, Digby Co., N. S. he and Mrs. Mullen celebrated their fiftieth anniversary on July 30 of this year.

Funeral service was held at the Reformed Baptist Church, Havelock, N. S. on August 29, the pastor of the church, Rev. Marven Durling, officiating. Words of tribute were spoken by Rev. H. B. Ricker, Digby, N. S. and by Rev. G. R. Symonds, Marysville, N. B. Others taking part included Rev. Jack Dow, Port Maitland, N. S., Rev. N. E. Trafton, Yarmouth, N. S. and Rev. F. A. Watson, Marysville, N. B. Interment was in the Havelock Cemetery.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Ethel R. Mullen, Port Maitland, N. S., two daughters, Mrs. K. E. Sullivan (Helen), Wollaston, Mass., and Mrs. H. R. Young (Ethel), Los Angeles, California; four sons, Dr. Wilbur H. Mullen, Wollaston, Mass., Vernon W. Mullen, Kuching, Sarawak Rev. Laurence K. Mullen, Woodstock, N. B. and Bernard A. Mullen, Binatang, Sarawak; twelve grandchildren and several nieces and nephews.

Mr. Mullen held pastorates in N.B., N.S., and Maine, eleven pastorates in all. He served two terms as pastor at Hartland, N. B. and at Beals, Maine, his second term at Beals being his last pastorate which concluded in 1955. Pallbearers were four brothers, Walter, Edgar, Fred, and Earl Sabine, Leigh Sabine, and Lloyd Fulton.

Lawrence A. Wilcox, 37, Saint John, N. B., was tragically drowned on Saturday, July 27th. Funeral service was conducted by Rev. W. L. Fernley from Brennan's Funeral Parlors on Tuesday, July 30th.
