HIGHWAYS OF LIFE

The course of history can be traced in the highways man has made and used; the Red Indian followed "spots" on trees; primitive peoples use only footpaths; simple agriculturalists have sledge or "drag" trails: the early pioneers built turn-pike roads; the Romans built stone-paved roads; present day roads are macadamized and may have several lanes.

The Bible tells us of many "ways" of life, Religious leaders have so meddled with them that many travellers are confused as to the importance and safety.

Broadly speaking, there are two ways of life: (i) the broad way and the narrow way (Matt. 7:13-14), (ii) the way of light and the way of darkness (Job 38:19; Proverbs 4:19), (iii) the way of the wicked and the way of the righteous (Job 22:15; Psalm 1:6).

Many people deliberately or ignorantly get on the wrong road; others get lost or confused about the right road to take. Thomas, the Disciple, once said, "Lord, HOW can we know the way?" John 14:15.

It may be helpful to list some of the characteristics of the TWO ways of life:

A. Wrong Roads: (i) the way of the fool (Proverbs 12:15), (ii) a way that SEEMETH right, (iii) the broad way (Matt. 7:13), (iv) the way of the ungodly (Psalm 1:6), (v) every false way (Psalm 119:104).

B. The Right Road: (i) the good way (1 Sam. 12:23), (ii) Jesus, the way (John 14:6), (iii) the way of the righteous (Psalm 1:6), (iv) the way of truth (Psalm 119: 30), (iv) the way of love (1 Cor. 13), (vi) the way of holiness (Isa. 35:8), (vii) the way of salvation (Acts 16:17).

C. Danger Signs along the way of life: (i) the way of man is not in himself (Jer. 10:23), (ii) the ways of a man are clean in his own eyes (Prov. 16:2), (iii) broad is the way to destruction (Matt. 7:13).

D. Important Road Signs: (i) let the wicked forsake his ways (Isa. 55:7), (ii) ask the way to Zion (Jer. 50:5), (iii) amend your ways and doings (Jer. 7:3), (iv) let us search and try our ways (Lam. 3:40), (v) seek of him a right way (Ezra 8:21), (vi) this is the way walk ye in it (Isa. 30:21).
