Both our hearts were drawn to hunger after deeper things and to cry out for the refreshing showers of blessing to be poured out on our parched souls. We marvel at the many ways that God uses to bind our hearts more closely unto Himself. We praise Him for the Holy Spirit Who is so faithful to our hearts. And we praise Him too for our good and godly people in the homeland. We are so glad that we can claim them as our associates.

Last Sunday I preached to two separate congregations from I Cor. 8 emphasing the need of conducting our lives in such a way that what we do, even though it may not be basically evil, will not harm our Christian testimony. The chapter, dealing with people so recently converted from their pagan idols to Christianity lends itself well to help these people so recently converted from heathen worship and still obliged to live in a heathen community to a large extent.
