Charles L. Owens, B.Sc., M.B.A. Howard Cogswell, B.A.

Effective July 1, Mr. Charles Owens becomes principal of the high school department at Bethany Bible College. Mr. Owens assumes this post after two years of teaching experience within the department, as well as a year's teaching experience in Moncton, N. B.

Mr. Owens has had extensive training at the college and university levels. At Eastern Nazarene College, Mr. Owens received a bachelor's degree with a major in business administration. From there he went on to Toronto University to receive a master's degree in commerce. Since entering the teaching field, Mr. Owens has taken a number of courses at the University of New Brunswick to improve his standing and ability as a teacher. This summer will be his third summer of special studies at U.N.B.

Mr. Owens is to be highly commended for his dedication to his teaching assignment. The school and its students have been the beneficiaries of his continued efforts to render the best service. Besides serving as principal and teacher, Mr. Owens will continue as registrar for the coming year.

Mr. Owen's co-worker will be Mr. Howard Cogswell, a native of Fort Fairfield, Maine. (This will be the first time in the history of the school that we have had two teachers with master's standing on the high school staff.)

Recently Mr. Cogswell completed all his residence work at Tufts University for a master's degree in English literature. Only his thesis remains to be completed.

Mr. Cogswell took earlier training at Eastern Nazarene College, where he received a B.A. in literature in 1958. After two years in the U. S. Army he took further studies at E.N.C. and also at Boston University.

Mr. Cogswell is especially well prepared to teach English and French. In both college and university his main interest has been in the field of English. In high school and college he has had several years of study in French. Along with formal study in French, he has had the benefit of travel in France and a year's teaching experience in college French. He speaks and reads French with ease.

Another area in which Mr. Cogswell will make an outstanding contribution is in the work of the library. He has had several years' experience in three different libraries, learning all the aspects of library science. Presently he is in charge of cataloguing at Wentworth Institute, Boston.
